

What Is Transnational Law?

Under conditions of globalization and Europeanization, the law may no longer be comprehended from a purely nationalist per-spective. For this reason, we offer a new field of specialization in "transnational law". In accordance with Philip C. Jessup, a former judge at the International Court of Justice, we understand this term in a broad sense to denominate "all law which regulates actions or events that transcend national frontiers". Such a definition overcomes the traditional dichotomies of national and international as well as public and private law: "Both public and private international law are included, as are other rules which do not wholly fit into such standard categories."
