Description:

The regulation of social media platforms has become a hotly debated topic especially due to the negative effects of "hate speech" and "fake news" on public discussion and political decision-making (US election 2016, Brexit referendum, Trump's de-platforming 2021). This debate raises the question of who can and who should determine the structure of the evolving digital public sphere (private companies, government bodies, multi-stakeholder boards, ...) and of what values should guide this process. Furthermore, the discussion about the regulation of globally active platforms has repeatedly revealed differing opinions between the United States and Germany/Europe. These differences have political, economic as well as cultural reasons and contain considerable potential for conflict between the transatlantic partners in the future.

This course will address the issues mentioned above and introduce you to the subject area of Internet/Media Governance by examining the regulation of hate speech on social media platforms from an international and comparative perspective. We will be analyzing a German anti-hate speech law, the Network Enforcement Act (NetzDG) and track its impact on the EU's new Digital Services Act (DSA). We will consider arguments for and against such legislation from both sides of the Atlantic. Furthermore, we will explore key elements of the discourse on freedom of expression in the digital age in order to better understand the complex relationships and power dynamics between governments, platforms, and us, the users.

Topics may include: platforms' content moderation practices and their implications, state regulation and the danger of overblocking/censorship, the impact of different legal traditions in the US and Germany, US concepts of free speech and the German idea of a "wehrhafte Demokratie" (militant democracy).
