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## Studying with a child

Insights into everyday life: Three students report on experiences, hurdles and help.

## *Kristin:* Challenges in balancing studies and family

"I actively decided against taking a semester off (parental leave) because at the time my child was born, online-only semesters were still being conducted (due to the covid-related pandemic). This was very convenient for balancing my studies and family. However, by switching back to face-toface lectures, I was confronted with the challenge of finding courses that were compatible with my partner's care hours or the regular hours of the childcare facilities. Unfortunately, this proved to be very difficult, as the range of block seminars or evening events was limited and the use of hybrid courses was/is also very rare. Therefore, one should take care of the timetable early on when resuming studies. Furthermore, networking with other students was helpful for me, especially during the semester when I could only attend a course irregularly. Another solution can be the childcare offered at the university, e.g. the Kinderland. It should be noted, however, that you have to take care of a place in time, since the places are usually in great demand."

## *Karlotta:* Breaking out of the daily student routine motivational aids

"During my prenancy I was in my internship (Master of Ed.) and I was able to attend all of the scheduled lectures and seminars at the end of my pregnancy. Unfortunately, due to health restrictions, it was not possible for me to complete all the corresponding examinations. After the pregnancy and maternity leave, I lacked motivation and the necessary daily study routine. The free psychological counseling and the social counseling of the Studierendenwerk Bremen are there to manage such crisis situations. I became aware of the wide-ranging offer through the events of the "Study Work Life Week", which deals with precisely such focal points and organizes lectures on interesting topics. The regular meetings in the form of the Parents' Café (offered by the AG FFS) have been very helpful in rebuilding my relationship with the university. The exchange with other students who do care work also encourages me to reorganize and structure my everyday life."



## Finja: Pregnant during your studies – and then?

"At the beginning of my pregnancy, I contacted the family care office on campus relatively quickly for advice. That was a great help, as I had not previously been involved with the family services at the university. That's were I learned about the Working Group: Family Friendly University and the family room, which I have now also used a few times for work. However, I did imagine that studying with a child would be a little easier. For this reason, after the birth of my child, I decided to take two semesters off (parental leave) to take some of the pressure off myself. The good about parental leave is

that you can still take exams if you want to. For me, it was also very challenging to adjust my schedule to the times of childcare – because many seminars and courses take place in the afternoon. Some teachers were very cooperative in this regard and offered me alternative options so that I could still attend. From others, I would have liked a little more flexibility. The online offer during Corona was very helpful to me in my situation. It would be great if this opportunity for digital teaching were to continue to be used in the future, because this would make seminars and lectures."



# Being on the campus with children

You will find a large wooden playpen in the cafeteria. This is a great place to meet other parents and socialize while your children can play and have fun. Toys can be borrowed for free from the Family Care Office. A microwave is provided as well.

## University canteen on the university boulevard

The Studierendenwerk offers free lunch in the cafeteria for children of students up to the age of six. In order to take advantage of this offer, a one-time registration is required at the service point of the University canteen. Needed documents:

- a Copy of the child's birth certificate
- the Certificate of enrollment from a parent or legal guardian

## Family area with space to play

In the lower area of the cafeteria (with a lakeside view) is a large, versatile children's play island. Here, small and large children will find physical "challenges" appropriate to their age. In addition to the play area, high chairs are available. There is also a large information board with current dates and further information for student parents.

## Cafeteria in GW 2

In the cafeteria there is a large wooden playpen with toys. This is where parents with children meet to play and chat. There is also a microwave for heating baby and toddler food. The Working Group: Family Friendly University (AG FFS) offers two different rooms that are particularly childfriendly.

## The family room:

Is intended for all who need a suitable place to work in peace with or without children. You can enter ist through the floor of the campus kids (childcare facility). Available are, among others, a sofa corner, a kitchenette with microwave, a baby crib and a desk for work.

## The AG room:

Is at the same time office and recreation room and it can be visited for short-term use. It is also a place for meeting and exchange.

Among other things, a ball bath, children's books, craft materials, toys, a sofa corner, tables, a kettle and a changing table are available.

# Students with young children are welcome in the University Library.

A family room (3290) is available on level 3. You will also find a small book box with picture books on level 1, which your children are welcome to use during their visit to the library. A changing table is available in the handicap restroom on Level 1. Strollers can be taken into the library.

## Parent-child workstation in GW 1

On the 2nd floor of GW1, there is a freely accessible parent-child room in room B2090. This room can be reached by elevator. The parent-child room is equipped with a desk and chair as well as a children's table with children's chairs. You will also find a changing mat, various toys and a play sofa in the room. ## Kinderland

Kinderland provides reliable childcare in a safe and friendly environment for children to develop and grow. It is organized by student assistants who are responsible for the care and supervision of the children while their parents attend lectures or other university activities. This facility is financed by the AStA, the university and the Studierendenwerk and offers a wide range of toys and playground equipment for children of different ages. Kinderland also has an outdoor area where children can play in a protected environment.

## Age of children:

Children are cared for in mixed-age groups, starting at 6 months.

## Care hours:

The care period is from Monday – Friday, 8 a.m.– 6 p.m., the children of studying parents can be cared for up to nine hours a week. In exceptional cases, such as block seminars on weekends, Saturday care can also be arranged. Location: Sports Tower, Level 1 Contact: kinderland@uni-bremen.de

## campus kids

The concept of campus kids aims to enable children to have a variety of experiences and to be active in a self-determined way. Children learn and discover through their senses. To do this, children need a safe, protected environment in which they can experiment. This is exactly what campus kids offers. Two educators take care of the children every day and are therefore permanent reference persons. In addition, two other permanent staff members are part of the team to support the group activities and provide sick leave cover. Trainees who are completing a practical part of their training or studies are also firmly integrated into the group's daily routine.

## Uni-Kita e.V.

The facility is committed to a concept that focuses on the care and support of the individual child. In doing so, they primarily rely on the basics of the situational approach and make the everyday life of the children and their families the object of learning. The goal is to support each child with his or her personal biography in understanding his or her own individual environment and in shaping it in a self-determined and competent manner. The children are seen as creators and shapers of their own living environment and are supported with emotional security and care. The different abilities of the individual child are addressed and strengthened

## Group size:

Five all-day nursery groups, each with 8 Children. For children from 1–3 years. A kindergarten group with 18 children, aged 3–6 years. Each group usually has two educators/specialists and, if necessary, one intern.

### Study centers and academic advising

#### Study centers

Study centers are the central point of contact for students with questions about study planning and examination regulations. In individual cases, the study centers are also the point of contact for subject advising and recognition of examinations. The study center also collects information that is important for studying and forwards inquiries.

#### **Student Advisory Service**

As a rule, the subject advising is carried out by elected university lecturers of the study program. They advise on questions of study content, e.g. in connection with the structure of the study program, study design, examination questions, possible focus, etc. The examination committees are responsible for the recognition of study achievements. The examination committees are responsible for the recognition of academic achievements. The current contact details of the advisors can be found under "Contact and Advising" in the study program.

#### Practice offices and practice officers

Practice offices support students in preparing, planning and carrying out an internship. In addition, students can find help in practice offices for their professional orientation. 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# Financing your studies with a child

International students have financial aid options available to them to facilitate their studies in Germany. However, it is important to note that you may not be eligible for financial aid in Germany, which may affect your residency status. We strongly recommend you become well-informed and seek individual counselling before applying for financial aid, whether in the form of scholarships, work opportunities, or government benefits. There are counseling services at our university that can help you create an individualized financial plan. The first point of contact could be the Social Counselling of the Studierendenwerk or AStA BAföG- and social counselling.


