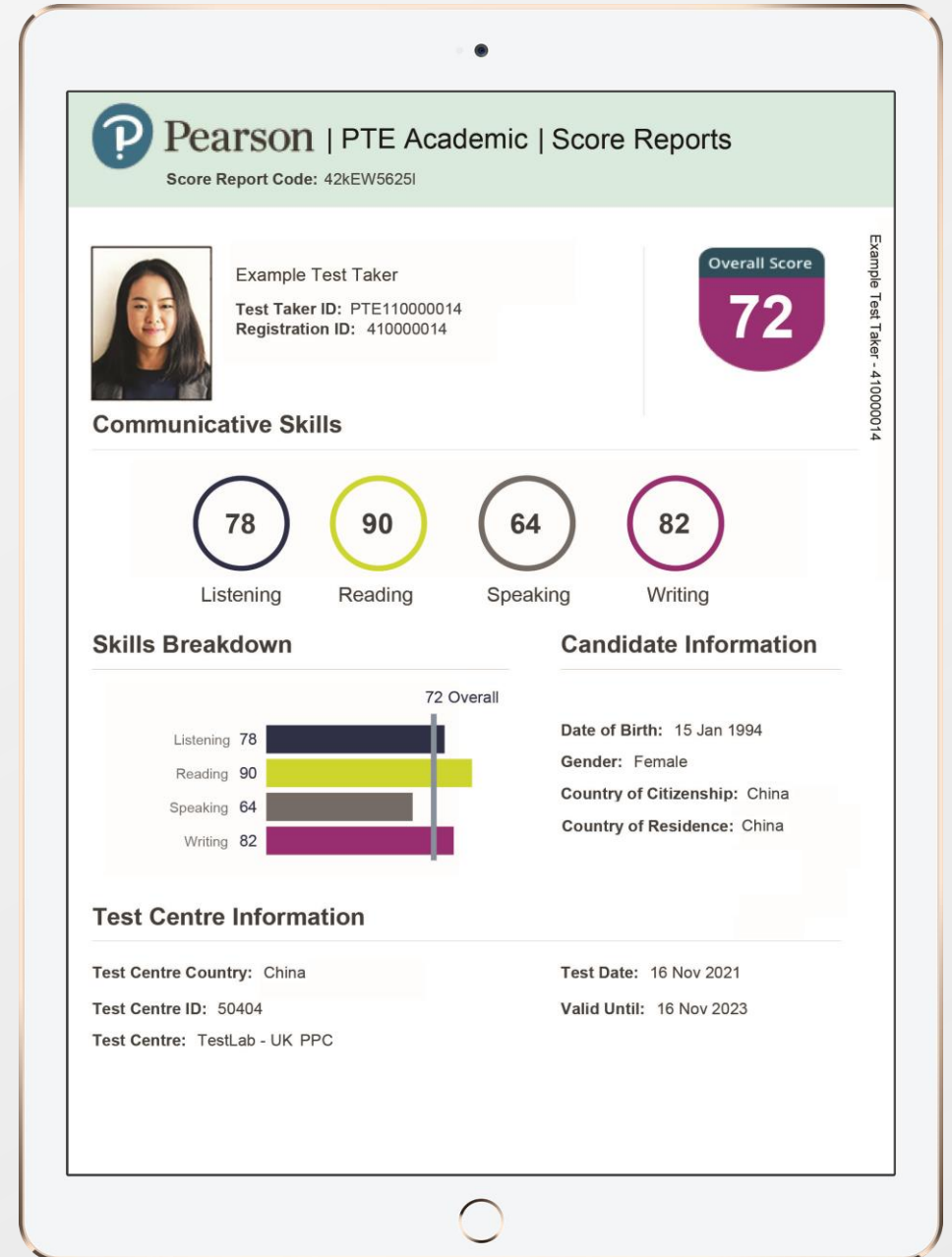

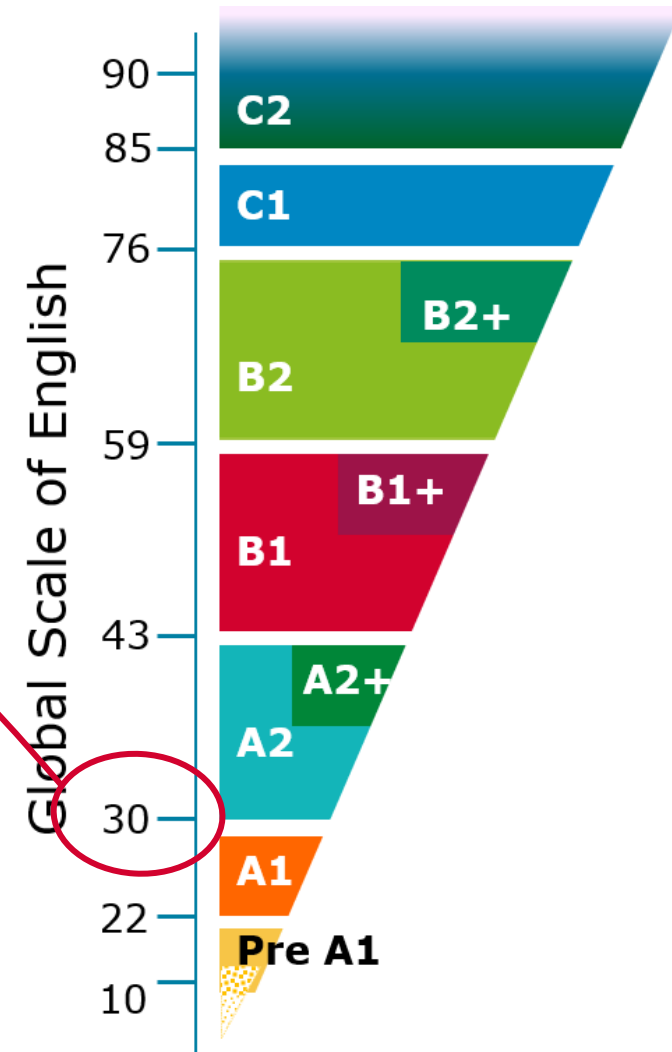
Common European Framework

- mainly focussed on **general English** with limited reference to work and study
- 60%+ of Can Do statements focus on **Speaking**
- wide levels that take many hours to master – so **difficult to show regular progress** is being made
- **difficult for teachers to use** in their day-to-day teaching and testing

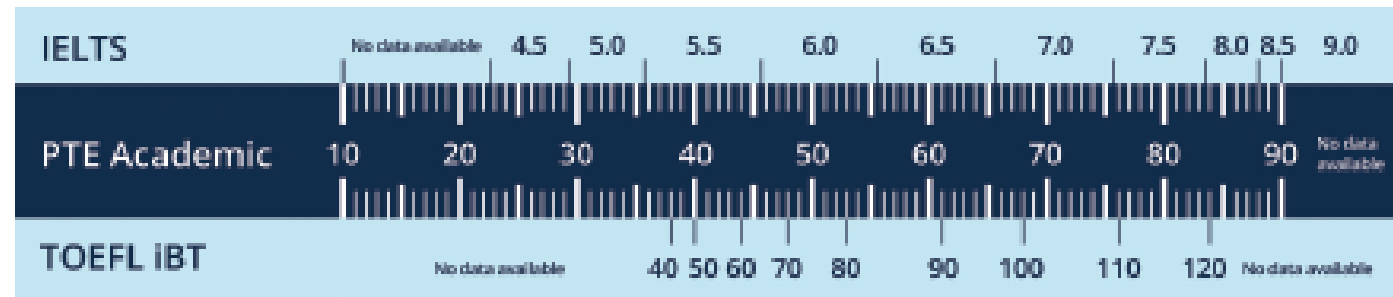
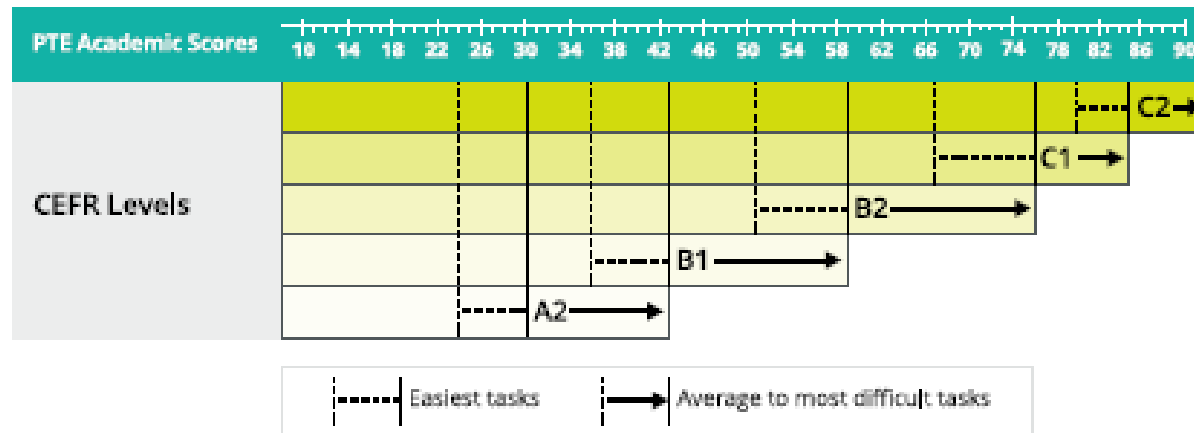


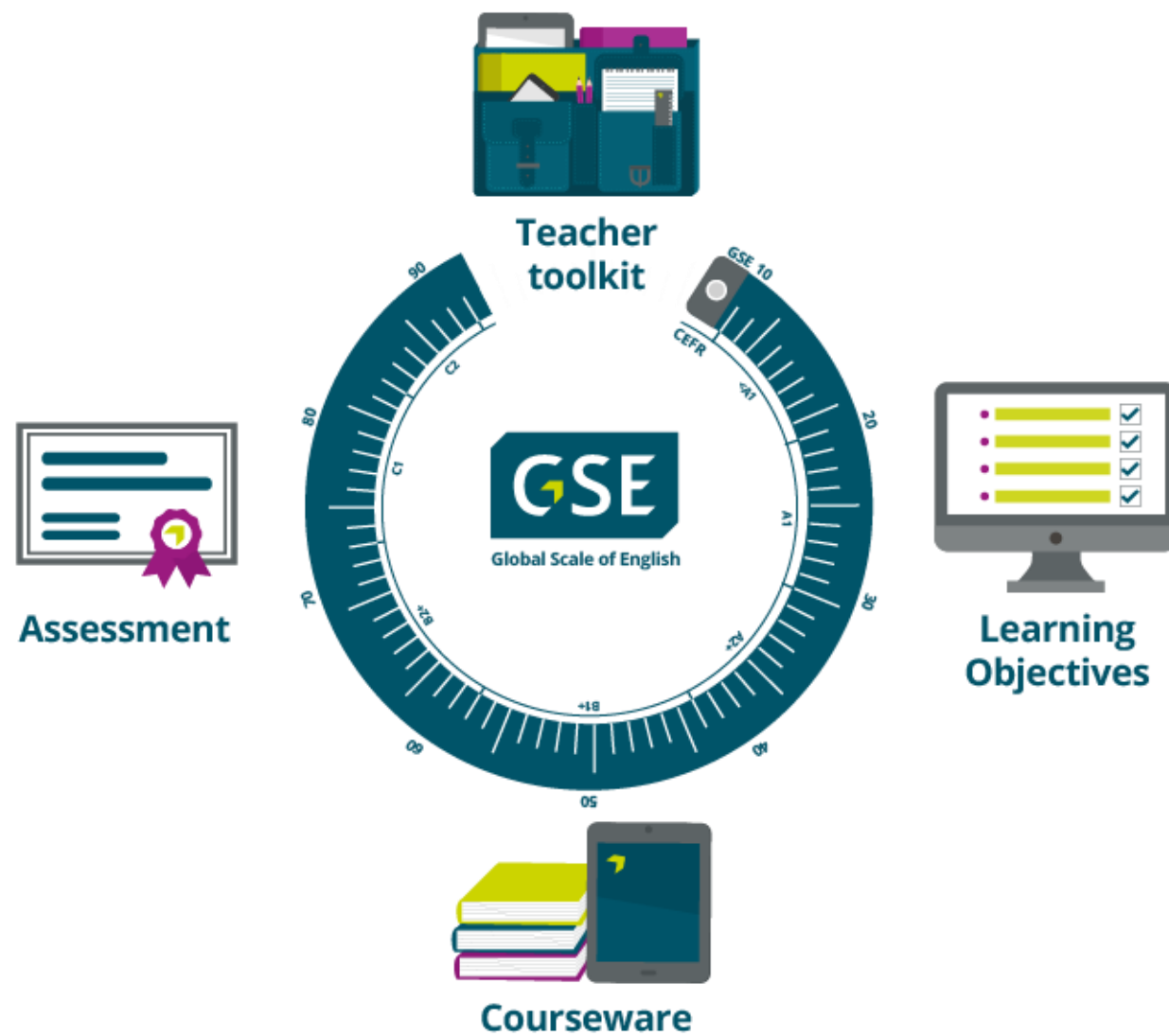

Psychologists, self-help gurus, and parents all work to make their clients, friends, and children happier. Recent research indicates that happiness is **functional** and generally leads to success. However, most people are already above neutral in happiness, which raises the question of whether higher levels of happiness **facilitate** more effective **functioning** than do lower levels. Our analyses of large survey data and **longitudinal** data show that people who experience the highest levels of happiness are the most successful in terms of close relationships and volunteer work, but that those who experience slightly lower levels of happiness are the most successful in terms of income, education, and political **participation**. Once people are **moderately** happy, the most effective level of happiness appears to depend on the specific outcomes used to define success, as well as the resources that are available.

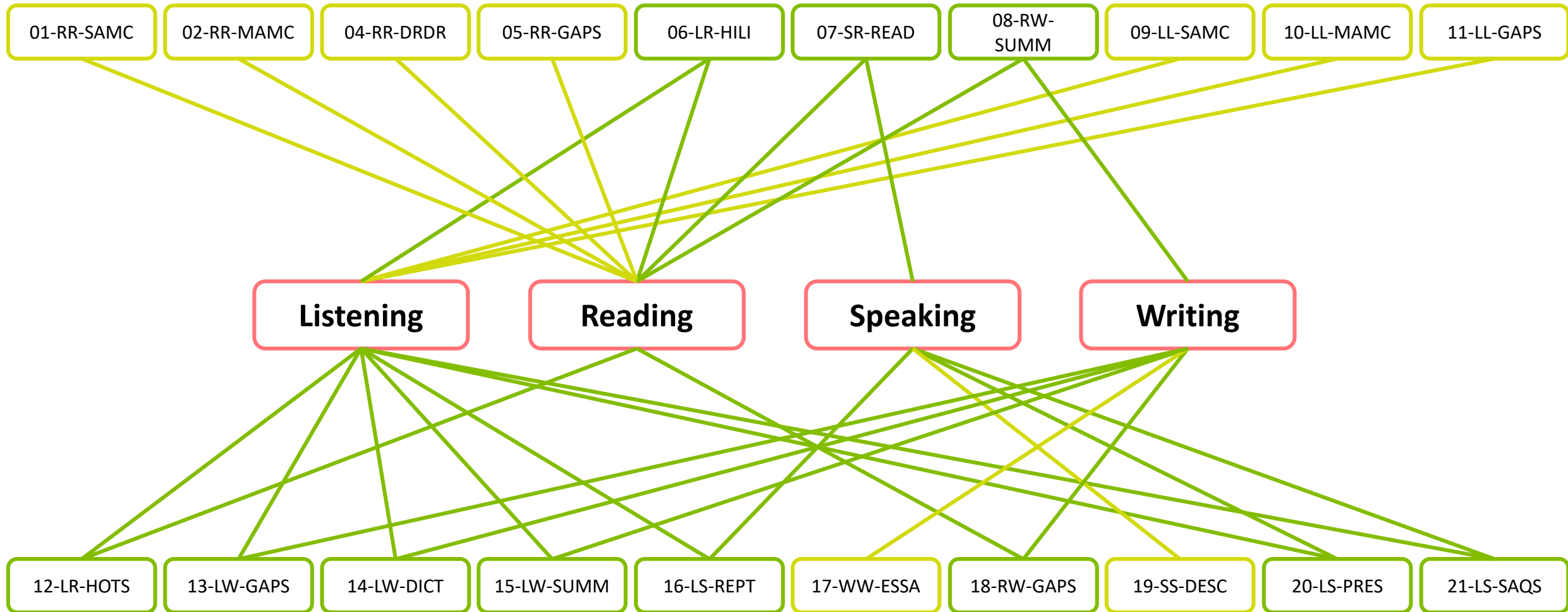



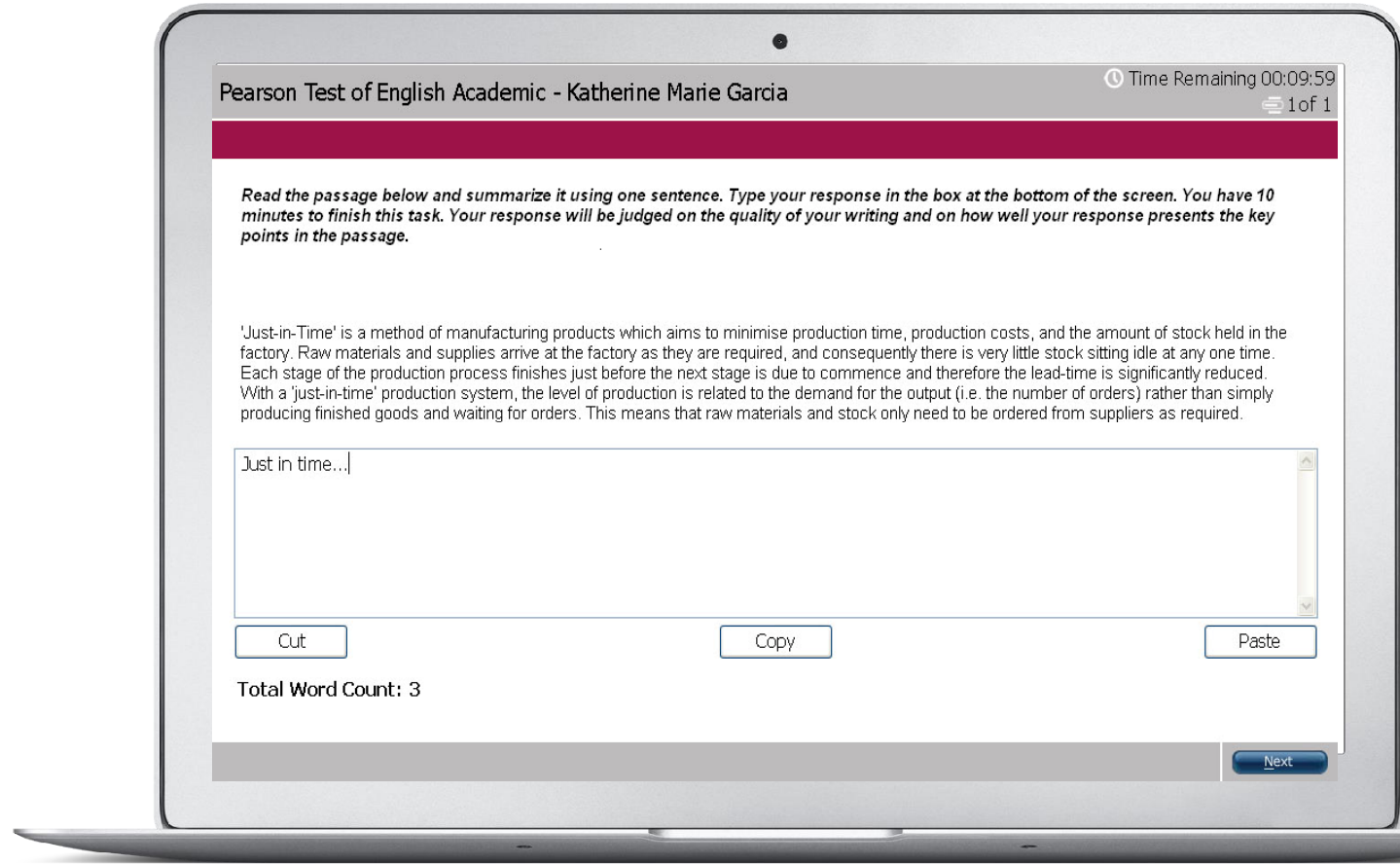

Formal requirements	<p>1 Is written in one, single, complete sentence</p> <p>0 Not written in one, single, complete sentence or contains less than 5 or more than 75 words. Summary is written in capital letters</p>
Grammar	<p>2 Has correct grammatical structure</p> <p>1 Contains grammatical errors with no hindrance to communication</p> <p>0 Has defective grammatical structure which could hinder communication</p>
Vocabulary	<p>2 Has appropriate choice of words</p> <p>1 Contains lexical errors with no hindrance to communication</p> <p>0 Has defective word choice which could hinder communication</p>

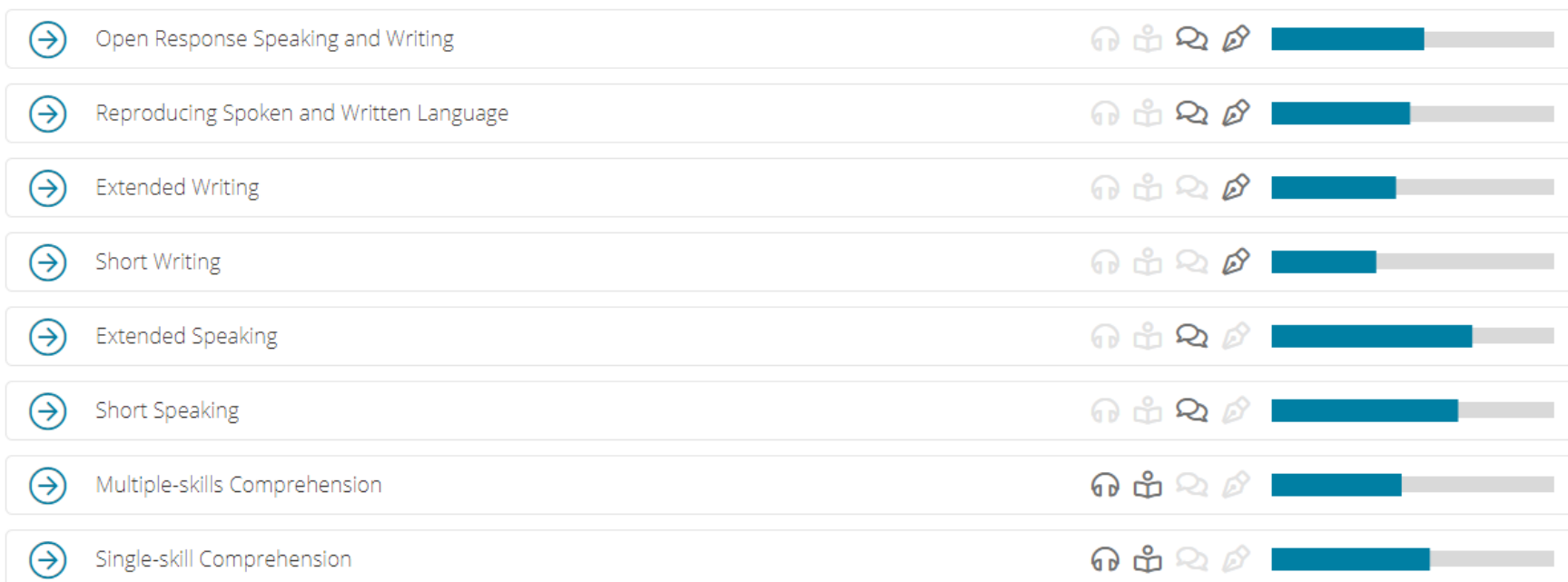
What are the benefits?

- Focussed language learning and assessment
- More realistic tasks – how language is really used
- Authentic – close to what students will hear and use in the wider language community
- Contextualised – the use of language is more meaningful; so more memorable
- More testing points means greater reliability

Performance bars

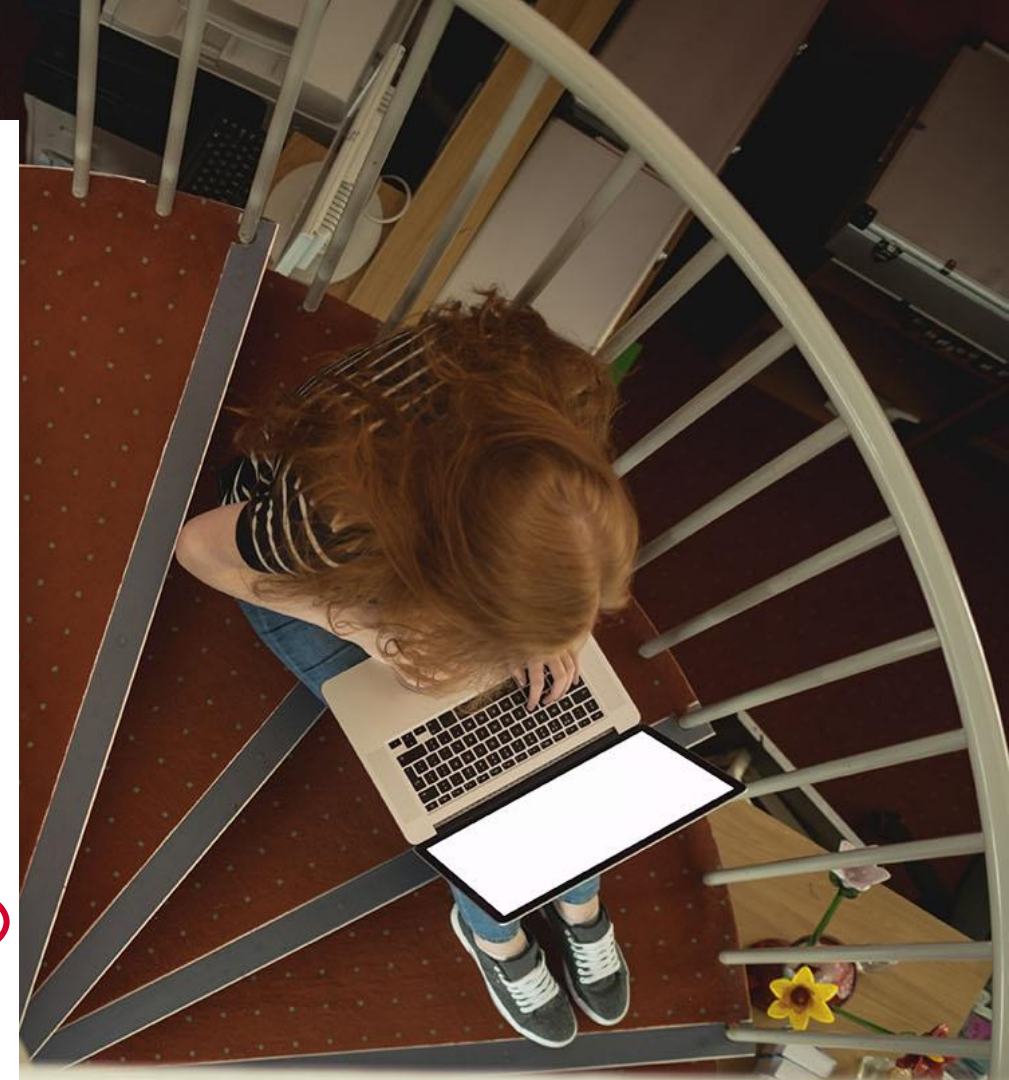
Test takers will see variations in their Skills Profile assessment bars depending on how they performed on task types within the test.

Open response speaking and writing	Giving your own spoken or written response
Reproducing spoken and written language	Repeating or copying spoken or written information
Extended writing	Giving a long written response
Short writing	Giving a short written response
Extended speaking	Giving a long spoken response
Short speaking	Giving a short spoken response
Multiple-skills comprehension	Using more than one skill (e.g. listening to a clip and then giving a spoken response)
Single-skill comprehension	Using only one skill (e.g. reading)
